THE EVIDENCE INTO PRACTICE AWARD

We will be looking for examples of how research is translated into practice, spreading evidence of 'what works' in order to improve practice

IMPROVING PUBLIC HEALTH PRACTICE AWARD

For this award the judges would like to see a case study that shows good public health practice, capable of influencing the practice of others.

COLLABORATIVE WORKING AWARD

For this award, the judges will be looking for a case study that shows good partnership working to improve public health outcomes, and to influence collaboration by others.

4

CONTRIBUTION TO PUBLIC HEALTH SKILLS AND KNOWLEDGE AWARD.

For this award you can nominate anyone contributing to practitioner registration – assessor, co-ordinator, mentor or verifier who can show the link between improving practice and registration.

The Evidence into Practice Award will honour the memory of Alison Thorpe, who achieved so much in developing and communicating good public health practice.
